

Memories in Mosaic

The following collage of personal memories helps paint a portrait of how God acted within St. Romero, and how compassion keeps winning over ideology.

Father Romero? He was a friend of the poor and a friend of the rich. To the rich he would say, "Love the poor ." and to us poor he would tell us to love God, and that God knew what He was doing by putting us last in line, and that afterwards we would be assured a place in heaven. He would preach to us about the heaven where rich people who gave alms would go and where poor people who didn't cause too much trouble would go.

María Varona

He celebrated a memorial mass for the dead at Tres Calles. That's where I met him. That Monseñor Romero made me mad. He was so wishy-washy! He talked about "the dead" instead of the people who had been "murdered" and he preached a sermon condemning violence, which practically suggested that those poor men had been killed because they were violent, that they somehow had it coming to them. *Rafel Moreno*

We went looking for him to offer our support. He didn't seem like a powerful hierarch to me, more like a brother. "I feel more comfortable with you people who aren't Catholic than with some from my own Church". He confessed shortly after meeting us. Monseñor added a lot of momentum to the ecumenical movement that was starting to build in El Salvador between Catholics and Protestants – Lutherans, Episcopalians and Baptists. We were all involved in the same kind of work. *Edgar Palacios*

Verse 1 and Refrain: God of the Poor (Beauty for Brokenness)

I certainly did meet Monseñor Romero. And even if I live to be 100 years old, I'll never forget it. He visited our canton for the festival of Saint Anthony. A big crowd showed up to receive him, and since there were so many of us that we didn't all fit in the church, he said we should have the Mass under a tree outside. He seemed to me to be a good-humored man, and kind of quiet, like us.

Later on in the afternoon there was a long line to see him off. I was the last to say good-bye. When he hugged me, he said "Pray for me".

He wanted me, an old sinful woman, to pray for him! How many times does that happen? It's supposed to be the priest that prays for you and lifts you up to God, but not with him. He turned that rule upside down.

Why did you change, Monseñor?

"You know, I ask myself that same question when I'm in prayer...." He stopped walking and was silent.

And do you find an answer, Monseñor?

Some answers, yes...It's just that we all have our roots you know....I was born into a poor family. I've suffered hunger. I know what it's like to work from the time you're a little kid...When I went to seminary and started my studies, and then they sent me to finish studying here in Rome, I spent years and years absorbed in my books, and I started to forget about where I came from. I started creating another world. When I went back to El Salvador, they made me the bishop's secretary in San Miguel. I was a parish priest for 23 years there, but I was still buried under paperwork. And when they sent me to San Salvador to be the auxiliary bishop, I fell into the hands of Opus Dei, and there I remained....

We were walking slowly. It seemed like he wanted to keep talking.

Then they sent me to Santiago de Maria, and I ran into extreme poverty again. Those children that were dying just because of the water they were drinking, those campesinos killing themselves in the harvest....You know, father, when a piece of charcoal has already been lit once, you don't have to blow on it much to get it to flame up again. And everything that happened to us when I got to the archdiocese, what happened to Fr. Grande and all.....it was a lot. You know how much I admired him. When I saw him dead, I thought, "If they killed him for what he was doing, it's my job to go down that same road..." So, yes, I changed. But I also came back home again.

"It has become my job to tend to all the wounds produced by the persecution of the Church – to record the abuses and pick up the bodies. Today it is my job to tend to this church, this space that has been violated, this sanctuary that has been destroyed and, above all, these people who have been humiliated and sacrificed in such an inhuman way."

That's how Monseñor Romero began his homily. If a person were to ask a bishop what his mission is, he might say anything but that. But that day Romero said his job was to go around gathering dead bodies. Precisely, in the El Salvador of that time,

the most realistic mission, the one most in line with the historical moment, was for a bishop to retrieve the daily dead, to receive them, to gather them in. *Jon Sobrino*

Verse 2 and Refrain: God of the Poor (Beauty for Brokenness)

Every day, what he said was what gave us life. His sermons were the most eagerly anticipated event of the week. I was working in the communities of San Ramon, and on Sundays I would leave my house and walk to the Cathedral. I didn't have to carry a radio with me to hear his homily, because I could hear it the whole way there; there wasn't a single house that didn't have its radio on listening to him. My entire route was a homily! It was a chain of radios with a broadcast as uninterrupted as if it were a single transmission.

In the mornings we had to sweep and clean the whole building. They had these enormous brooms and these immense mops, and we had to make those halls, that were as long as railroad tracks, shine. One day I was going along with that monster of a mop - shining up the hall in front of the chapel on the top floor. As I went by, I saw that at that early hour of the morning, there was a priest praying in one of the front pews. He was all alone, kneeling.

After a while I had practically polished the whole floor, and he was still in there praying. The fool didn't even move! I went down another hall and got it all shiny, and then went back and peeked into the chapel. There he was, still kneeling! "What's he doing there, praying so much?" I thought. Another 15 minutes went by and he was still there. "Why so much prayer? With all that is happening in this country, all he can think of to do is pray? He should learn a few things from Monseñor Romero, a man with fire in his heart and in his words, a man who doesn't waste his time! Hadn't he even heard that song, "Praying is not enough?" He ought to listen to some of those homilies."

I was angry with the praying man, whoever he was. "if he doesn't come out, I'm going in to mop the chapel" I needed to clean it, but I also wanted to see whether maybe he was just sleeping.

Finally I went in. I wanted to get a good look at the man so I could tell the rest of the guys at breakfast. I went up and down with the mop, getting closer and closer to that motionless lump of a man, and I looked at him from head to toe...It was Monseñor Romero.

A congressman from the US was passing through El Salvador and went to Mass one Sunday at the Cathedral. The church was full to overflowing. He was moved by the piety of all the poor people and by Romero's homily. But what really made an impression on that gringo's heart was the lousy shape the Cathedral was in. "This church doesn't give a good impression", he lamented. Doesn't Monseñor Romero take care of his most important church?

They told him that when Romero had become archbishop, he'd begun a plan to rebuild, but that soon he'd changed his mind.

"This is not the most important thing", he'd said.

For Monseñor, people came first. And that's why he said the cathedral would remain that way: half done, as a monument to the people who don't have a roof over their heads or land to plant on, people who have neither bread nor peace.

El Salvador Updates from Around the Diocese

Thanks, too, to those around our Diocese serving the missions in El Salvador in different ways, shapes, and forms. Your service honors St. Romero's legacy and that of our own Cleveland martyrs, Sr. Dorothy Kazel, OSU, and Ms. Jean Donovan.

COAR Peace Mission, Wickliffe

COAR Peace Mission has been supporting the COAR Children's Village and COAR school in Zaragoza, El Salvador, since the Salvadoran Civil War in the 1980s. Today, we have about 30 children in permanent, residential, foster care. For these children, COAR supplies 100% of the funding for food, medicine, medical specialists, clothing, school tuition and supplies, housemothers, psychologists, social workers, everything they need to begin to heal from the trauma they experienced before coming to COAR. The COAR school educates about 1,000 students, grades preK-12. This year, COAR has started to offer scholarships to local, non-resident students in order to help them further their education at the high school level.

Resurrection Church, Solon

Our blessed sacrament chapel was dedicated to the martyrs of El Salvador. Hanging in the chapel are images of Saint Oscar Romero, the churchwomen, the Jesuits, and their housekeeper and daughter.

Every year on or around the time of the death of the churchwomen, our parish hosts a prayer service to commemorate their martyrdom, as well as to keep the history of our diocese and mission in El Salvador alive among our parishioners and those who celebrate with us. We often celebrate this prayer service in collaboration with other entities within the diocese.

We continue to offer financial support to a woman's cooperative in El Salvador that provides tuition assistance for young women going to college or off to trade schools.

St. Barnabas Church, Northfield

St. Barnabas is excited to host Fr. John Ostrowski, pastor of San Pedro Apostól parish in Teotepeque, El Salvador, in May during his visit to the US. Fr. John will be accompanied by two of the Franciscan sisters that work with him in the parish. They will attend the priesthood ordination for Deacon Jeffrey Lindholm, who spent a summer ministering with Fr. John and will also meet with supporters at St. Barnabas, St. Rita, and St. Albert the Great.

St. Dominic Church, Shaker Heights

The St Dominic El Salvador mission program supports the community of Chiltiupán, El Salvador with many active ministries. These include a college scholarship program (with 130 current students), the Santo Domingo Clinic, a Salvadoran construction team, monthly food baskets, and more. We offer 6 mission trips each year and staff four full-time Salvadorans that lead our programs, and help set up and facilitate these mission trips. These trips have been so impactful that a few families and a couple other parishes have used these holy men to facilitate their own mission trips! We are blessed by wonderfully generous parishioners, partner churches and friends that all give financially and spiritually to this program and are answering the call of St. Romero to serve the poor. We are proud to carry on the Diocese of Cleveland CLAM initiative, and follow the lead of so many holy men and women, especially Sr. Dorothy Kazel, Jean Donovan, Sr. Ita Ford, and Sr. Maura Clarke.

St. Joseph's Church, Strongsville

We have a sister parish in San Jose Villanueva (SJV), El Salvador that was established by Fr. Bob Sanson and grown by Pat Greco with in-country visits beginning in 2004. This is a spiritual partnership that reciprocates both ways, as we pray for each other, parish families, priests, and leaders. We have an annual scholarship drive, which raises \$10-12K per year for the Catholic students in SJV and goes towards tuition, shoes, books and other needs. This overview and coordination is provided by and supports Epilogos Charities Inc, a US based nonprofit that in turn helps support the same community in El Salvador. In addition to the scholarships, the parish supports smaller projects in the SJV community through the "Sharing Tree" and one envelope per year. Students at our parish school, Sts. Joseph and John (a combination of St. John Neumann and St. Joseph's in Strongsville), also maintains a letter exchange program. Teachers at the school in SJV have even been able to visit Strongsville through the "Connecting Communities and Cultures" program, which provides great momentum in maintaining our sister parish connection.

St. Rita Church, Solon

The Saint Rita CLAM Team nurtures relationships between Saint Rita parishioners and our brothers and sisters in El Salvador through education, group travel, mission trips, and sharing of funds and resources. We hope to have a teen trip in 2026. We have been working with Fr. John Ostrowski in Teotepeque and Fr. Paul Schindler in La Libertad to assist with any needs that arise within their parishes. Our focus for 2025/26 will be repairs and improvements to the church and convent in Teotepeque, as well as college scholarships.
